

Limited edition luxury

A GAP in the building industry for premium architecturally designed houses has been filled.

A signature series of limited edition, ready-to-build homes have been created by the renowned architects at Auhaus Architecture for local Barwon Heads business Life Spaces Group.

This is believed to be a first for Australia according to Life Spaces Group director Elliot McLaren.

"There is not a business in the country doing anything like this ... customers get lost in the void of they can't afford a high-end architect but don't want a volume builder product, so where do they go?" Elliott asks.

"It is an Australian first with leading architects designing small signature ranges reflective of their vision."

For those who want an architecturally designed house but don't want to go through

the long design process, this could be the answer.

Auhaus Architecture have designed a series of five houses and to maintain exclusivity, only 10 of each design will ever be built.

The first house, known as the Courtyard House, is already under construction in Barwon Heads and will be on display for two weeks once finished.

The Courtyard House has been designed for relaxed living with a material palette of bluestone and natural hardwood.

The house is positioned around a large central courtyard which acts as an outdoor entertainment area.

Life Spaces Group plan on commissioning more leading architects in the future to continue to fill this gap in the market.
